WSU adopts new athletic identity

Wayne State University, by recommendation of an universitywide task force, has adopted a new athletic identity system. The new system replaces a limited and dated identification system and introduces the Warrior team name and mascot.

The previous name, Tartar, first appeared in 1927 after a contest held on the then City College campus. Before the Tartars, school nicknames included the Griffins and the Munies. The new name, Warriors, embraced characteristics associated with the WSU student body and athletic teams — a fierce determination and an ability and willingness to compete and succeed. The Warrior name also provides a bridge to the Tartar heritage, thus providing an effective means to retain the loyalty of those who want the Tartar name to live on.

2000-2001 WSU Hockey Outlook

With one year under its belt and the first year jitters out of the way, the 2000-2001 Wayne State men's hockey team is looking for an exciting second year of competition.

For the upcoming season, the Warriors return 20 letterwinners from last year's squad that finished with a 6-23-1 record. Looking to lead Wayne State are goaltenders Marc Carlson and David Guerrero, along with 19-goal scorer Dusty Kingston and points leader Jason Durbin (29). In addition, the European connection of Daniel Rafner, Kalle Rahn and Maxim Starchenko should blossom into an effective skilled unit.

The goals for this year's team is to win a minimum of 15 games and to win the College Hockey America (CHA) regular season and championship title. Last year, Wayne State was not eligible to compete as a member of the CHA (which is also in its second year of existence) but this season the Warriors can challenge for the conference crown. "Every league game will have a tremendous amount of importance," notes second year head coach Bill Wilkinson. "The CHA championship is out goal. The opponents in the league are extremely competitive and will demand the best efforts from our players."

The strengths and the backbone of the Warriors this season

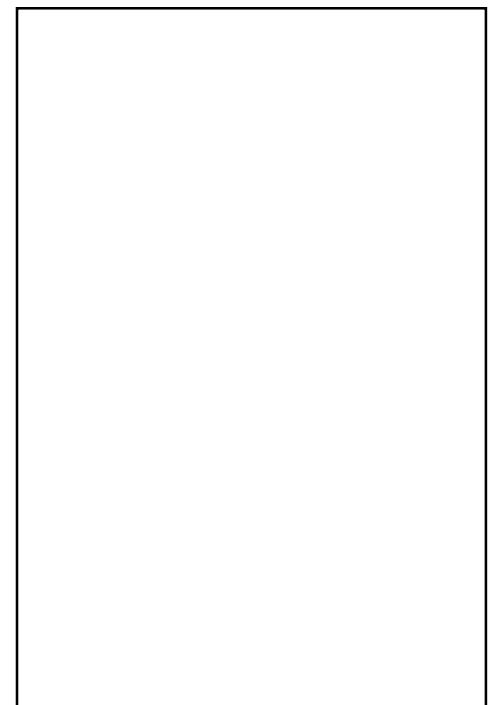
will be in goal as both Carlson and Guerrero return, along with the addition of Brett Leone waiting in the wings. Last year, Guerrero led the team with a .902 saves percentage and an 3.25 goals against average in 1052 minutes. Carlson was equally as impressive with his .897 saves percentage and a 3.44 goals against average. With one year of experience for both Carlson and Guerrero, this upcoming year should showcase their talents even more.

The weakness for Wayne State this season will evolve around its youth and inexperience. Should the Warriors start experiencing injuries to key players on the blue line, the other players may have to learn to play other positions.

Also returning for their second seasons are Kingston and Durbin. Last year, Kingston led the squad with 19 goals and five assists for 24 total points. He was named the Warriors' "Rookie of the Year" and had two stretches last season where he scored at least one point in three games. Durbin led the team in assists (18) and points (29) and was second in goals scored with 11. He received the team's "Top Gun" award for becoming the team's top scorer and was also honored as team captain. Versus Mercyhurst in the Findlay Tournament, Durbin scored five points, and had four games

where he scored four points and three games where he scored three points.

The European connection of Rafner, Rahn and Starchenko could be one of the allies for the Warriors. Due to transferring, both Rafner and Rahn competed in only 14 games while Starchenko played in 12. In Rafner's 14 games, he scored nine points (six goals, three assists) while Rahn scored three points (one goal, two assists). Starchenko added eight points with his four goals and four assists. All three will add considerable strengths and effective-

ness on the ice for the upcoming season.

Key newcomers who will be challenging the returnees for ice time include defensemen Marc St. Jean and Matt Zito along with Stefan Petroski up front. The true freshmen who will be looking for playing time include forwards Jack Redwood from the Compuware Ambassadors; Jarrett Gibbons and Jackson Wilson from the Central Ontario Junior A Hockey league and Travis Rycroft and Chris Vail from the British Columbia Junior Hockey league.

This year's schedule will test the Warriors early as they travel and play at Lake Superior State and Notre Dame from the Central Collegiate Hockey Association league. Wayne State rounds out its schedule with a complement of teams from the MAAC along with the competitive balance of teams from the tough CHA.

The Coaching Staff

Bill Wilkinson Head Coach



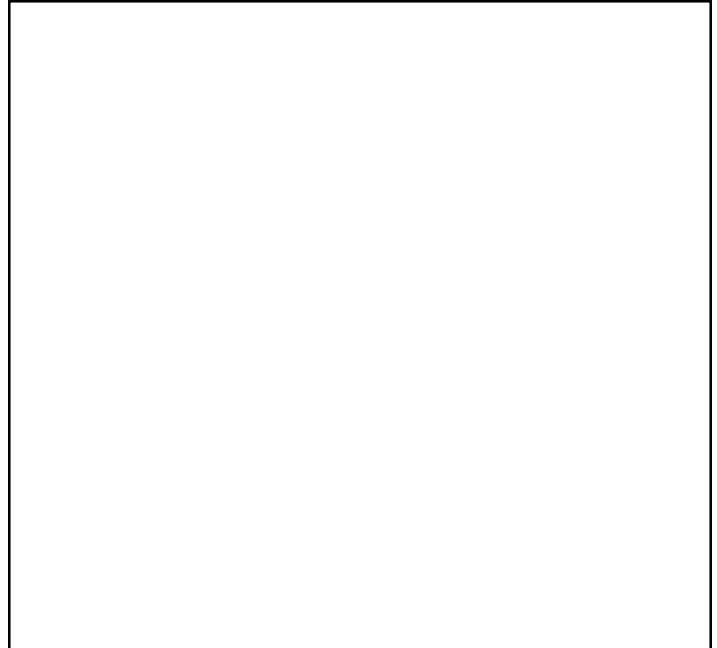
Bill Wilkinson embarks on his 19th season as a collegiate coach as he begins his second year at Wayne State University (WSU) after being appointed in March, 1999. In his first year as head coach for the Warriors, Wilkinson led Wayne State to a 6-23-1 record under the program's inaugural year. Prior to last season, Wilkinson was the head coach at Western Michigan University

(WMU) for 17 years.

In his illustrious career, Wilkinson had been named the Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CCHA) "Coach of the Year" three times (1983-84, 1985-86, 1995-96) and was twice a finalist for national coach of the year honors. Entering the 1999-2000 season, he ranks 37th all-time and 11th among active collegiate coaches in career wins.

While at Western Michigan, Wilkinson's team reached postseason play 14 of the last 15 years and advanced to the NCAA Tournament on three occasions (1986, 1994, 1996). His 1985-86 squad, arguably the best in Western's history, captured the CCHA playoff title while his 1995-96 team finished one point out of first place in the CCHA regular season race. Four different years, his teams finished in the top 12 nationally in the NCAA Coaches poll. Other coaching highlights include winning the Great Lakes Invitational in 1986, the Riverfront Invitational in 1987 and the 1995 Syracuse Invitational.

With the aid of his assistant coaches, Wilkinson, 53, has recruited and developed some very talented players. Twice at Western Michigan, two of his players (Dan Dorion in 1986 and Wayne Gagne in 1987) had been named runners-up for the Hobey Baker Memorial Award, college hockey's Heisman Trophy, while eight former players have reached the NHL. In addition, five players had been named All-American a total of seven times and 21 players earned 30 All-CCHA certificates. On the academic side, WMU was the only CCHA school to have an all-league academic honoree 14 consecutive years. During that time, 26 players

achieved 49 scholarstic honors. Six Academic All-Americans have also played under Wilkinson.

As chairman of the NCAA Division I Ice Hockey Committee, Wilkinson has worked the last three NCAA finals.

Prior to being named WMU's third head coach on March 29, 1982, Wilkinson served as an assistant coach at Bowling Green State University from 1980-82, coaching defensive play. In 1979, he was an assistant at the University of North Dakota, a season in which the Sioux came within a goal of winning the NCAA title.

Wilkinson began his coaching career where his playing days ended, at St. Lawrence University, a school that has produced numerous bench bosses. A two-way player at center and defense, Wilkinson led the 1967-68 Saints squad in scoring (15-21—36). He also was named team MVP and was awarded the Brian P. Doyle Memorial Trophy as team captain in 1969-70. He graduated from St. Lawrence with a bachelor's degree in physical education (1970) and later added a master's degree in education (1976) from the same school.

Bill and his wife, Mary, have three sons — Peter, 28, a former WMU player embarking on his third season as assistant coach at Michigan Tech; Mark, 22, a senior on the WMU hockey team; and Bryan, 18, a Senior at on the Portage Central hockey team.

Entering his second season with the Warriors is Danny Brooks. Brooks is no stranger to Head Coach Wilkinson's ways as he served as an assistant coach to Wilkinson at Western Michigan University during the 1998-99 season.

Before WMU, Brooks served as assistant coach during the 1997-98 season at Bentley College under Head Coach Jim McAdam.

Recently retired from the professional ranks, Brooks played for the Wheeling Nailers of the East Coast Hockey League (1997-98), Fresno Falcons (1992-94) of West Coast Hockey League, and the Muskegon Fury of the Colonial Hockey League (1992-93). In between, he played for first division teams in England and Germany.

A native of Natick, Mass., Brooks was also a member of the championship-winning Anaheim Bullfrogs of Roller Hockey International.

Danny, 33, received a bachelor's degree in Liberal Arts from the University of Brandon in 1992 and is currently working on his master's degree. He and his wife, Nicole, reside in Novi.

Willie Mitchell

Assistant Coach



Willie Mitchell begins his second season with the Warriors after serving three years with Michigan State University. While at MSU, Mitchell worked in all facets of the hockey program but was primarily the team's goaltender's coach. As their coach, MSU produced two consecutive First Team All-American goaltenders (Chad Alban in 1998 and Joe Blackburn in 1999), and one Hobey Baker runner-up (Alban in 1998).

A native of Windsor, Ontario, Mitchell was a collegiate goaltender at Northern Michigan, where he helped guide the team to the 1989 WCHA playoff championship. After two years at NMU, Mitchell played with the Canadian National Team before completing his undergraduate education at Western Ontario, where he earned "Rookie of the Year" honors in 1992.

After graduating from Western Ontario in 1993, Mitchell joined the University of Colorado in Boulder as the program's head coach, making him the youngest head coach in the ACHA. In three years at Colorado, Mitchell compiled a 38-36-2 record. He has 15 years of additional coaching experience in various hockey schools throughout Canada and the United States. In addition to his coaching duties, Mitchell also worked as a color commentator on MSU's radio broadcasts.

Born May 15, 1969, Mitchell is single and lives in Farmington Hills, MI. Last year, he completed his master's degree in Athletic Administration at MSU.

The President and University

Irvin D. Reid

Dr. Irvin D. Reid was selected as the ninth president of Wayne State University on August 25, 1997, by WSU's eight-member Board of Governors. He comes from New Jersey's Montclair State University where he served as president since 1989.

The new president takes responsibility for the continued growth of one of the nation's leading research universities, with more than 30,000 students, 1,700 full-time faculty, 14 schools and colleges, including law and medicine, and an operating budget of \$329 million.

He is dedicated to the urban university and its roles in the social, cultural, economic and intellectual lives of residents and businesses in the area.

Reid is particularly interested in forming stronger ties with the local business community, and will bring a service-based approach to the university's operations, treating students as customers. That approach was evidenced at Montclair through the creation of an Academic Success Center where students could obtain all the help they needed in one stop.

Reid has a 31-year career as a faculty member and academic administrator. At Montclair, which was previously a state college, he helped the school achieve university status in 1994 based on advancements in its academic programs, facilities and faculty.

Other initiatives he achieved include increasing opportunities for gifted students through the honors program, a global educational program and support of technology and computerization on campus.

Prior to assuming the presidency at Montclair, Reid was a tenured professor at the University of Tennessee-Chattanooga. In 1981, he became chairman of the department of marketing and business law, and in 1983 he was appointed dean of the School

of Business Administration. As dean, he led the school to re-accreditation of the undergraduate school and initial accreditation of the MBA program. The school was recognized in 1987 as one of the top three regional business schools by *U.S. News and World Report*.

Reid was associate professor of marketing and business law in the School of Business and Public Administration at Howard University

from 1978-79. He was a full-time consultant for the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission in 1977-78.

Reid holds bachelor's and master's degrees in general experimental psychology from Howard University as well as a master's degree and a doctorate in business and applied economics from the Wharton School of Business at the University of Pennsylvania.

He is married to Dr. Pamela Trotman Reid, visiting professor of Psychology and Research Scientist at the University of Michigan. Their two children are Nicole Reid Gore, attorney, and I. Dexter Reid, software engineer.

Reid succeeds David Adamany, who announced his retirement in December, 1996, after serving as president since 1982.

The University

Wayne State University has progressed from a small, private medical college founded in 1868 to a national research university made up of 14 schools and colleges - including one of the largest single campus medical schools in the United States.

As it began its second century a few years back, WSU was cited by the prestigious Carnegie Commission on Higher Education with the following summary: "Few universities have seen and met the challenges presented by urban problems as Wayne State University has."

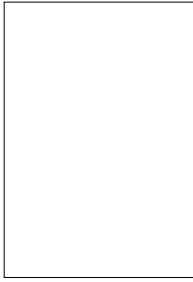
The University enrolls about 30,000 students each fall, 98 percent of whom live off campus and commute to Wayne State's campus in the heart of the University Cultural Center. The Wayne State student has a median age of 28.8 years and 98 percent of the student body remains employed while attending school.

Consistent with its urban setting, WSU stands as an avenue of opportunity to a first-class university for the low income and minority youth in the metropolitan Detroit area. Except for a few of the historically black institutions, many of them in the South, WSU enrolls the largest number of minority students of any state university in the nation. Nearly twenty-one percent of WSU's students are black, while over 14 percent are from other minority groups.

Besides the School of Medicine, WSU offers comprehensive programs in 13 schools and colleges: Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Fine, Performing and Communication Arts, Graduate School, Law, Liberal Arts, Lifelong Learning, Nursing, Pharmacy and Allied Health Professions, Science, Social Work, and Urban, Labor and Metropolitan Affairs. Though it is a university of the city, WSU has transformed its surroundings over the last decade from a collection of buildings intersected by concrete and blacktop streets into a more traditional college campus. An ambitious and ongoing beautification program has meant the greening of the campus, with lawns, trees and malls replacing many of the roads now closed at the entrance to center.

The University has matured during its 132 years; it now offers comprehensive programs of graduate and undergraduate study at a campus that offers the vitality of city life in a setting which also offers for quiet contemplation and study.

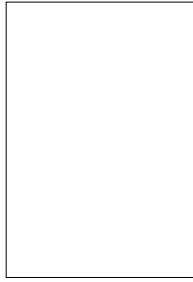
