WSU adopts new athletic identity

Wayne State University, by recommendation of an universitywide task force, has adopted a new athletic identity system. The new system replaces a limited and dated identification system and introduces the Warrior team name and mascot.

The previous name, Tartar, first appeared in 1927 after a contest held on the then City College campus. Before the Tartars, school nicknames included the Griffins and the Munies. The new name, Warriors, embraced characteristics associated with the WSU student body and athletic teams — a fierce determination and an ability and willingness to compete and succeed. The Warrior name also provides a bridge to the Tartar heritage, thus providing an effective means to retain the loyalty of those who want the Tartar name to live on.

Irvin D. Reid

Irvin D. Reid was selected as the ninth president of Wayne State University on August 25, 1997, by WSU's eight-member Board of Governors. He comes from New Jersey's Montclair State University where he served as president since 1989.

Reid takes responsibility for the continued growth of one of the nation's leading research universities, with more than 30,000 students, 1,700 full-time faculty, 14 schools and colleges, including law and medicine, and an operating budget of \$329 million.

He is dedicated to the urban university and its roles in the social, cultural, economic and intellectual lives of residents and businesses in the area.

Reid is particularly interested in forming stronger ties with the local business community, and will bring a service-based approach to the university's operations, treating students as customers. That approach was evidenced at Montclair through the creation of an Academic Success Center where students could obtain all the help they needed in one stop.

Reid has a 32-year career as a faculty member and academic administrator. At Montclair, which was previously a state college, he helped the school achieve university status in 1994 based on advancements in its academic programs, facilities and faculty.

Other initiatives he achieved include increasing opportunities for gifted students through the honors program, a global educational program and support of technology and computerization on campus.

Prior to assuming the presidency at Montclair, Reid was a tenured professor at the University of Tennessee-Chattanooga. In 1981, he became chairman of the department of marketing and business law, and in 1983 he was appointed dean of the School of Business Administration. As dean, he led the school to re-accreditation of the

undergraduate school and initial accreditation of the MBA program. The school was recognized in 1987 as one of the top three regional business schools by *U.S. News and World Report*.

Reid was associate professor of marketing and business law in the School of Business and Public Administration at Howard University from 1978-79. He was a full-time consultant for the U.S.

Consumer Product Safety Commission in 1977-78.

Reid holds bachelor's and master's degrees in general experimental psychology from Howard University as well as a master's degree and a doctorate in business and applied economics from the Wharton School of Business at the University of Pennsylvania.

He is married to Dr. Pamela Trotman Reid, visiting professor of Psychology and Research Scientist at the University of Michigan. Their two children are Nicole Reid Gore, attorney, and I. Dexter Reid, software engineer.

Reid succeeds David Adamany, who announced his retirement in December, 1996, after serving as president since 1982.

The University

Wayne State University has progressed from a small, private medical college founded in 1868 to a national research university made up of 14 schools and colleges - including one of the largest single campus medical schools in the United States.

As it began its second century a few years back, WSU was cited by the prestigious Carnegie Commission on Higher Education with the following summary: "Few universities have seen and met the challenges presented by urban problems as Wayne State University has."

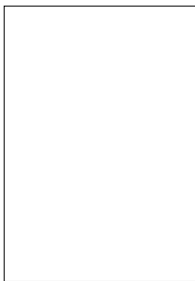
The University enrolls about 30,000 students each fall, 98 percent of whom live off campus and commute to Wayne State's campus in the heart of the University Cultural Center. The Wayne State student has a median age of 28.8 years and 98 percent of the student body remains employed while attending school.

Consistent with its urban setting, WSU stands as an avenue of opportunity to a first-class university for the low income and minority youth in the metropolitan Detroit area. Except for a few of the historically black institutions, many of them in the South, WSU enrolls the largest number of minority students of any state university in the nation. Nearly twenty-one percent of WSU's students are black, while over 14 percent are from other minority groups.

Besides the School of Medicine, WSU offers comprehensive programs in 13 schools and colleges: Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Fine, Performing and Communication Arts, Graduate School, Law, Liberal Arts, Lifelong Learning, Nursing, Pharmacy and Allied Health Professions, Science, Social Work, and Urban, Labor and Metropolitan Affairs. Though it is a university of the city, WSU has transformed its surroundings over the last decade from a collection of buildings intersected by concrete and blacktop streets into a more traditional college campus. An ambitious and ongoing beautification program has meant the greening of the campus, with lawns, trees and malls replacing many of the roads now closed at the entrance to center.

The University has matured during its 132 years; it now offers comprehensive programs of graduate and undergraduate study at a campus that offers the vitality of city life in a setting which also offers for quiet contemplation and study.

2000 SEASON OUTLOOK

Although last season may have ended in disappointment as the Warriors relinquished their GLIAC South Division championship crown for the first time in three years. This season Wayne State looks to recapture the title as they return nine letterwinners, all of whom saw time on the court last season. In addition, Head Coach Loretta Vogel adds another touch of consistency to the program as she returns for her second year.

"The biggest difference from last year to this year is consistency," notes Coach Vogel. "This is the second season that the team and I have been together and they know where I'm coming from and what I'm looking for in a player. This year a lot of time won't have to be spent with them learning my way of coaching; that's what last year was for. This season we can go into practice and spend more time on different plays and game situations." Last year, the Warriors finished with a 15-16 overall and 12-7 conference record.

Returning for their final season are seniors Amy Horgan, Basia Lukowski and Tracie Rucinski. Horgan, a 5-10 setter (Brighton, Mich./Brighton HS), is looking to continue placing her name in the Warrior record book. She is currently second on WSU's all-time list in assists with 3,305 and is fourth on the single season list with 1,265. Last year she finished seventh in the conference with 1,082 assists. Lukowski, a 5-10 outside hitter (Fraser, Mich./Fraser HS), is a three-time returning letterwinner who came on strong at the end of the season and led the team in service aces with 31. Rucinski, a 5-10 outside hitter (Clinton Township, Mich./Chippewa Valley HS), returns for her second and final season with the Warriors. Rucinski played in 20 matches last season and plans to see more time on the court in 2000.

The Warriors future also looks bright as four juniors and two sophomores return for this season while WSU adds three newcomers. This year's junior class includes: Katie Brogan, Jesselyn Good, Anavia McClure and Melissa Rucinski. Brogan, a 5-7 defensive specialist (Livonia, Mich./Livonia Ladywood HS), who split her time last season as the Warriors back up setter and main defensive specialist, will concentrate this season on being the team's primary passer. Good, a 5-10 outside hitter (Linden, Mich./Linden HS), re-

squad with 288 kills and comes back as the Warriors leading hitter. She also led the team last year with 355 digs and will mainly see time on the right side.

Returning for her second season is ophomore Marie Nowicki. Nowicki, a 5-10 outside hitter (Romeo, Mich./Romeo HS), saw action in ten matches last year and in six of 19 conference matches. She will see time mostly on the left side, but could also be used in the middle.

Cate Crist, Rebecca Hague and Nicole Salisbury look to see their first time on the court as Warriors this upcoming season. Crist, a 6-0 outside hitter (Dexter, Mich./Dexter HS), transfers to WSU after earning all-conference honors in volleyball at St. Clair Community College. Hague, comes to WSU after playing five years at Leamington Secondary in Leamington, Ontario. The 5-10 outside hitter earned All-County honors her last two years and named her team's MVP three times. Hague will start the season as a setter, but will also see time as a hitter. Salisbury, a 5-10, outside hitter (Ottawa Lake, Mich./Bedford Senior HS), was named Third Team All-State, Academic All-State, First Team All-Region and First Team All-County after playing at Bedford Senior High School.

turns as one of WSU's primary hitters. Last season, Good recorded 235 kills and 47 total blocks and will see time on the left side and in the middle. McClure, a 5-10, middle hitter (Detroit, Mich./Detroit Henry Ford HS) is the Warriors primary return blocker. Last year, McClure recorded 92 block assists and 21 block solos for a total of 113. Rucinski, a 5-9 outside hitter (Clinton Township, Mich./Chippewa Valley HS), is one of WSU's hardest hitters. Last year, Rucinski finished second on the



Loretta Vogel Head Coach

Entering her second season as head coach of the Wayne State University Warriors is Loretta Vogel. In Vogel's inaugural year last season, the Warriors finished with a 15-16 record overall and tied for second place in the South Division with a 12-7 record.

Vogel comes to WSU after serving an illustrious career at Utica Community School (1997-99) in Utica, Michigan, and Fraser High School (1986-1997) in Fraser, Michigan. Vogel, who coached at Fraser for 11 years, amassed an outstanding 465-96-31 overall record and had 68 percent of her athletes receive a scholarship to play collegiate volleyball. While at Fraser, Vogel led her team to two Final Four and three Quarterfinal appearances, while also winning Regionals five times and Districts eight times. In addition, Vogel was nominated Michigan High School Athletic Association's "Coach of the Year" in 1990 and in 1993. Vogel is also associated with VIP which is a volleyball club associated with AAU and USA volleyball. She has been involved with VIP since its beginning (1986) where she served as the club director.

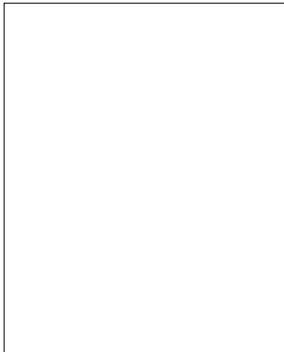
During her two year career at Utica Community Schools, Vogel coached the varsity volleyball team as well as teaching eighth grade Speech and History Classes. She also spent one year at Wayne State University (1996-97) as an adjunct professor and taught volleyball physical education and volleyball methods classes.

From 1983 to 1985, Vogel coached at Ladywood High School in Livonia, Michigan, where she posted a 42-23 overall record. She also served as the Athletic Director at Ladywood in addition to teaching Psychology and Physical Education. In 1980-1983, she coached at Dominican High School in Detroit, Michigan. At Dominican, Vogel posted a 47-7 overall record while being ranked in the State in 1982 and 1983. Prior to coaching at Dominican, she also coached at Napoleon Public Schools in Napoleon, Michigan (1978-79) and at Manchester Public Schools in Manchester, Michigan (1976-78). At Napoleon, Vogel posted a 20-2 overall record and was the State runner-up after winning the semi-finals, quarter finals, regional and district titles. At Manchester, she held the title of Women's Athletic Director while also coaching women's basketball, volleyball and softball.

Vogel is a native of Tecumseh and was born on February 12, 1952. She and her husband, Fred, reside in Shelby Township, Michigan, with their three sons, Andrew (16), Steven (13) and Spencer (11). Vogel graduated with a bachelor of arts degree in Speech and Communications from Adrian College (1976) and is currently working on her teaching credential at WSU.

Charisse Bialke Assistant Coach



Charisse Bialke begins her second season as assistant coach for the Wayne State Warriors. Since 1992, Bialke has coached for the VIP volleyball club based in Macomb County. Two years ago, she was the 18 and under director and coached the VIP's 18 Elite team. In 1997 and 1998, Bialke assisted current WSU head

coach, Loretta Vogel, at Utica High School.

Bialke is no stranger to the WSU program as she played volleyball from 1990 to 1994 under then head coach Matt Peck and assistant coach Chris Gravel (who is now the head coach at Hillsdale). While at WSU, Bialke played mostly the left front and defensive specialist positions, and was a three year varsity letterwinner. She attended WSU on a Presidential Scholarship and was a member of the athletic director's honor roll and the dean's list.

A 1990 graduate from Fraser High School, Bialke played under current WSU head coach, Loretta Vogel. While at Fraser, Bialke played four years and earned three letters in volleyball and earned All-County and All-League honors her senior year. In addition, she also played softball (catcher and first base) and basketball (center/forward) at Fraser while also being named to the National Honor Society. After graduation she stayed at her alma mater to coach freshmen volleyball from 1990-92, and also served as the junior varsity and assistant varsity volleyball coach from 1992-97.

Bialke, who is a native of Livonia, Michigan, was born May 19, 1972, and received her Bachelor of Science degree in Education from WSU in 1999. Currently, Bialke is a middle school science teacher for Allen Park Public Schools.

Rey Regualos Assistant Coach



Regualo joins the Warrior coaching staff after coaching volleyball at Concordia College this past season. His Wayne State duties will include player development and recruiting.

Prior to Concordia, Regualo coached at Dexter High School in Dexter, Michigan, for four years and also at Christian Heritage High School in Co-

lumbus, Georgia for three years. Regualo's other coaching duties have included coaching club ball in Southeast Michigan for the past four years, and at the University of Michigan's volleyball camps for the past five years.

Regualo is no stranger himself to the playing court as he was a setter for West Point's club team for two years and he also played six years while in the military.

A native of Battle Creek, Michigan, Regualo earned his bachelor's degree in Civil Engineering and Organizational Leadership from West Point in 1990, and his master's degree in Exercise Physiology from the University of Michigan in 1997. He is currently a second year doctoral student at Wayne State and is studying Physical Education and Exercise Science. Regualos is single and resides in Canton, Michigan.

After several false starts, the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference was founded in June, 1972. The charter members of the GLIAC were Grand Valley State University, Lake Superior State University, Northwood University, and Saginaw Valley State University.

During the previous two years before its founding, several attempts were made to create a new NCAA College Division conference. In 1971, the Great Lakes Athletic Conference was formed, but plans for the new conference were put on hold, and several of the participating schools subsequently withdrew their support. The idea did not die, though, and since 1972-73 the GLIAC has been a leader in the advancement

and promotion of intercollegiate athletics for men and women.

Expansion of the GLIAC began immediately with the addition of Ferris State University and Oakland University in 1972. Since then, Hillsdale College, Northern Michigan University, Wayne State University, Michigan Technological University, Northwood University, Ashland University, Gannon University, Mercyhurst College and University of Findlay have all joined the GLIAC conference.

Entering his ninth year as commissioner of the GLIAC is Tom Brown. He is responsible for all conference administration in the GLIAC.
